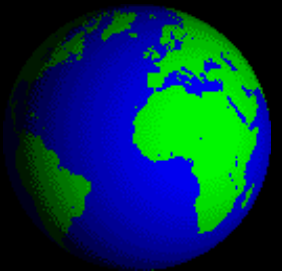

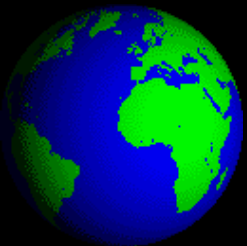

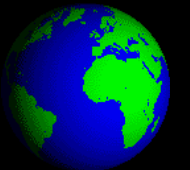

Health Benefits of Açai (Seek Medical Advice)

Acai berries are 1-inch round fruits that grow on acai palm trees, have a dark purple skin and yellow flesh surrounding a large seed. It has pits like apricots and olives, they're technically not a berry, but rather drupe. 100 grams of fruit pulp has the following nutrition: Calories: 75, Fat: 6g, Saturated fat: 1g, Carbs: 5g, Sugar: 1g, Fiber 4g, Calcium: 1%, Iron: 2%, Potassium: 5%, etc.

Side effects: gastrointestinal distress, allergic reactions.

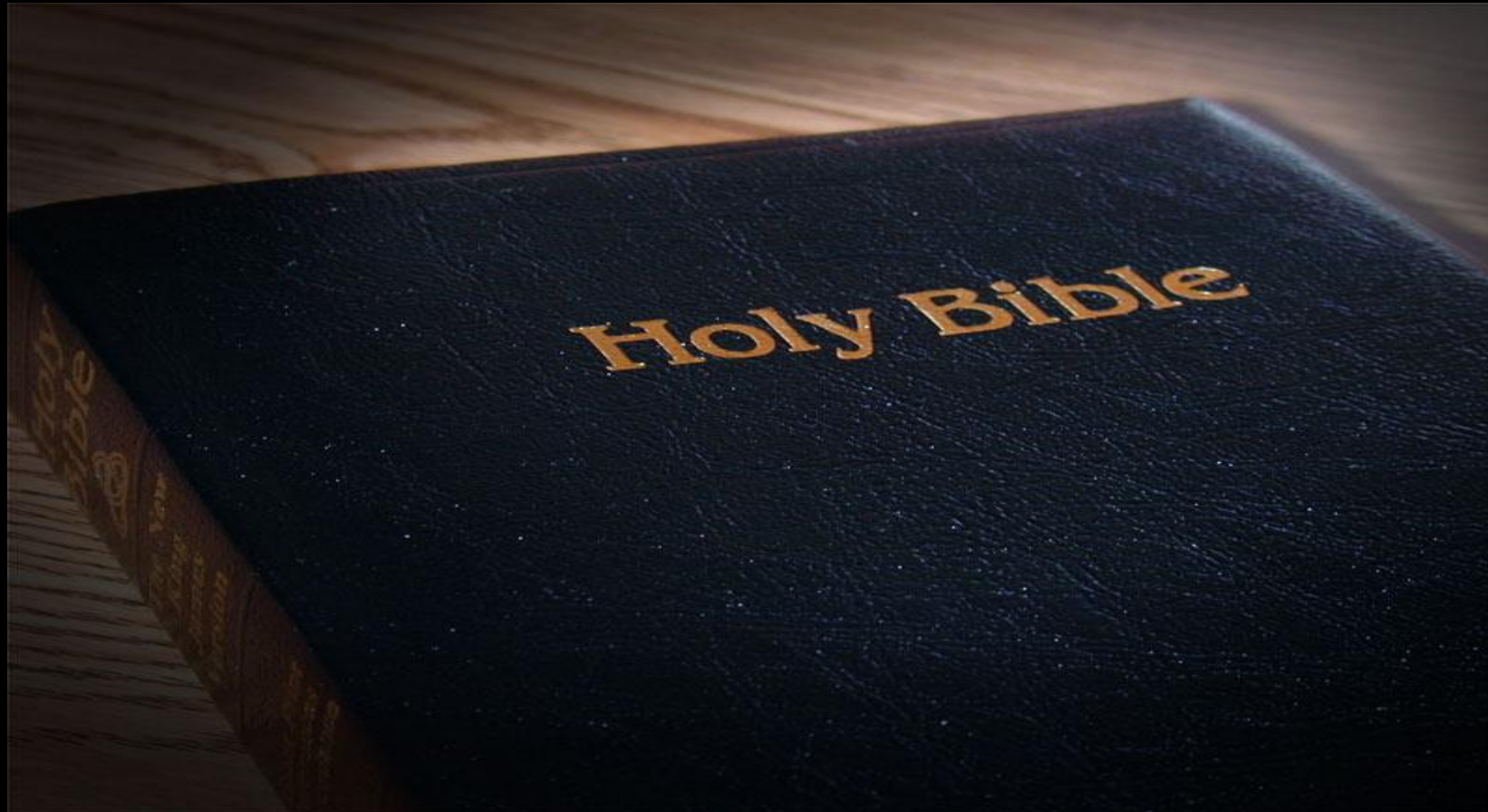

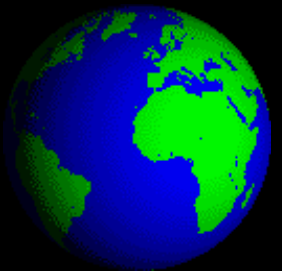

Introduction

The Identity of Jesus (Son of God): Mark immediately establishes Jesus as the Son of God and the Messiah ([Mark 1:1](#)), with the Father affirming him at his baptism ([Mark 1:11](#)) and demonic spirits acknowledging his divinity.

The Servant-Savior Concept: Jesus is portrayed not as a political conqueror but as a servant who came to serve and give his life as a ransom ([Mark 10:45](#)). He works with authority but also with deep compassion for the physical and spiritual needs of humanity.



Introduction

The Arrival of the Kingdom (1:14-15): A core theme is that "the time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand," requiring repentance and belief in the gospel.

Action and Miracles: Mark 1-8 is fast-paced, recording more miracles than sermons. These miracles demonstrate Jesus' power over demons, diseases, and nature, validating his authority, as seen in the healing of the leper, the paralytic, and calming the storm.



Introduction

The Call to Follow (Discipleship): Jesus calls disciples to move from being spectators to servants. The narrative challenges readers to follow him, even amidst potential persecution.

Opposition to the Servant: Early on, opposition arises from the Pharisees and religious leaders, highlighting the conflict between human traditions and God's true kingdom.

The "Messianic Secret": Jesus frequently instructs people not to reveal his identity prematurely (e.g., 1:34, 1:44), as he manages the public perception of his ministry.



Introduction

Structure of Mark chapters 1-8:

1:1-13: Preparation for ministry (John the Baptist, baptism, temptation).

1:14-3:12: Ministry in Galilee— healing, preaching, and authority.

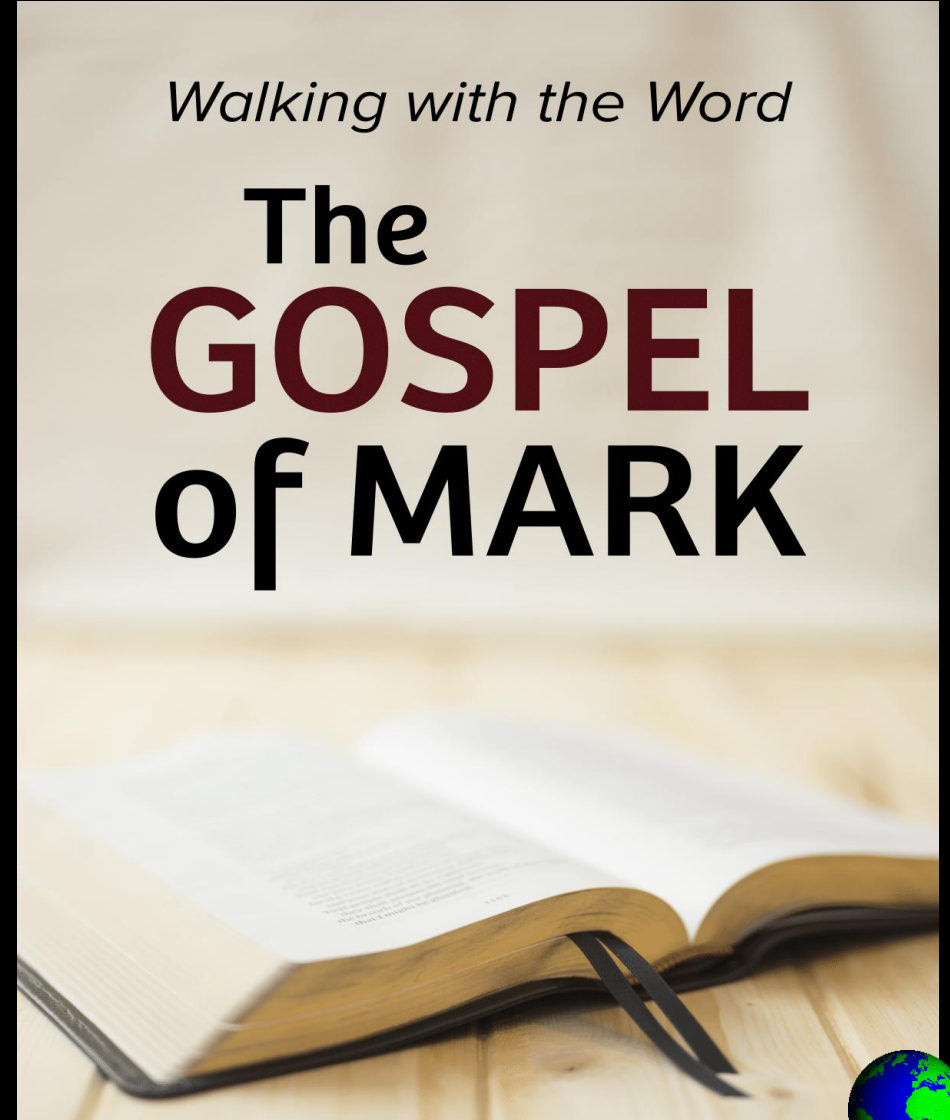
3:13-6:6: Commissioning the twelve, parables, and rejection.

6:7-8:26: Expanding mission, feeding the 5,000, and walking on water.

8:27-30: The turning point—Peter's confession, identifying Jesus as the Christ.

3 - Lessons in the book of Mark

Preparation and Repentance (Mark 1:1-15)

The Message of Repentance: Mark begins with a call to repentance as a daily requirement for believers, not just a one-time event.

Preparation Work: John the Baptist represents the preparation needed in our hearts for the Lord's coming.

The Kingdom is Here: Jesus teaches that the "time is fulfilled" (referencing the 70-week prophecy of [Daniel 9](#)) and the kingdom of God is at hand, demanding a response of faith.

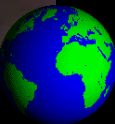
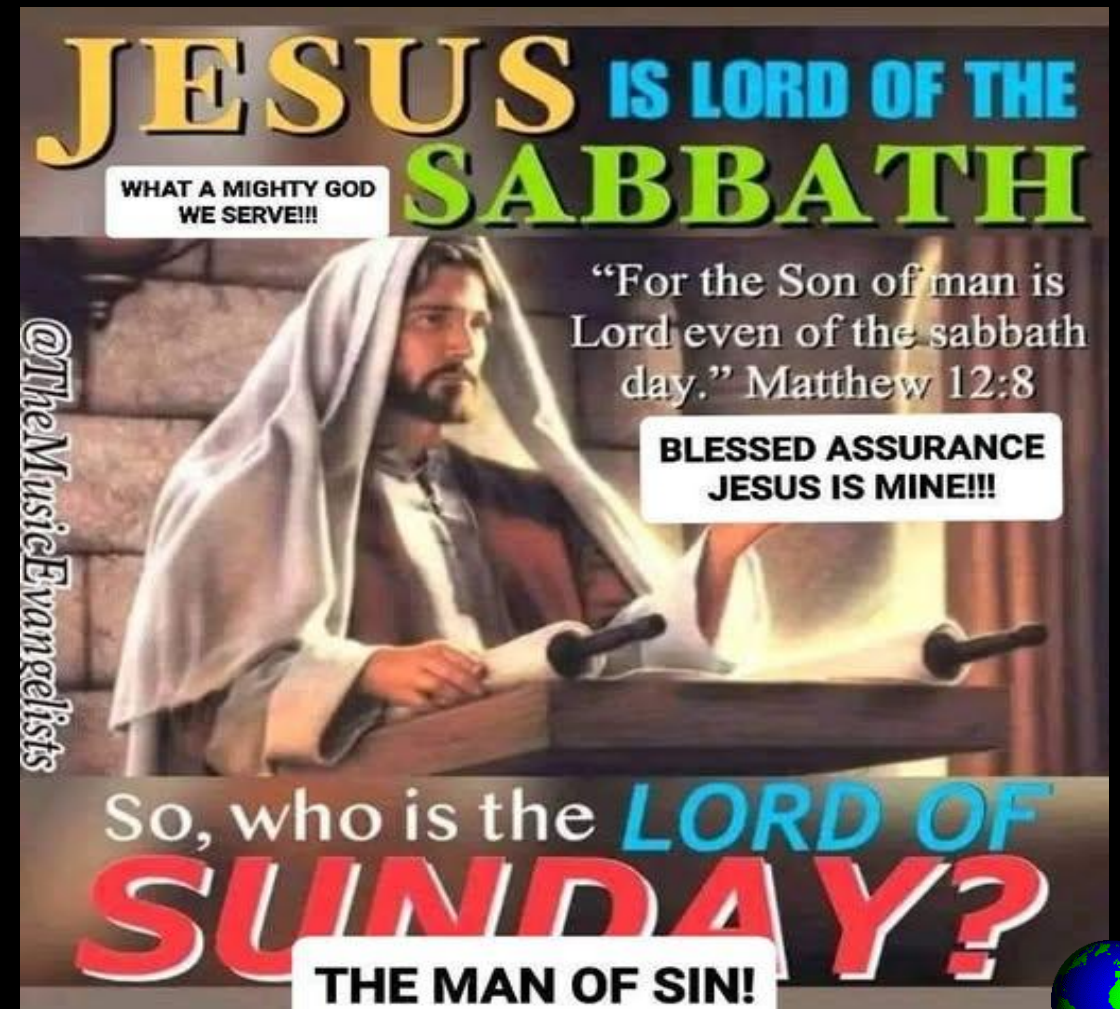
3 - Lessons in the book of Mark

Jesus' Authority and Compassion (Mark 1-3)

Power over Evil: Jesus demonstrates absolute authority over unclean spirits, sickness, and nature.

The Sabbath Controversy: Jesus shows that the Sabbath is a day for healing and doing good, not a burden of legalistic restrictions.

Humanity & Divinity: Jesus is seen as truly human—tempted by Satan, needing rest—and fully divine, with angels attending Him.



3 - Lessons in the book of Mark

True Discipleship (Mark 4-6)

Hearing and Understanding: The Parable of the Sower emphasizes the necessity of hearing the Word and allowing it to take root to produce fruit.

Trusting Jesus in the Storm: When disciples face "storms," they must learn to trust in Jesus' power, even when He seems silent.

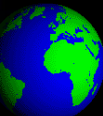
The Cost of Following: Following Jesus often leads to rejection by the world, but it is necessary to sacrifice comfort for the gospel.

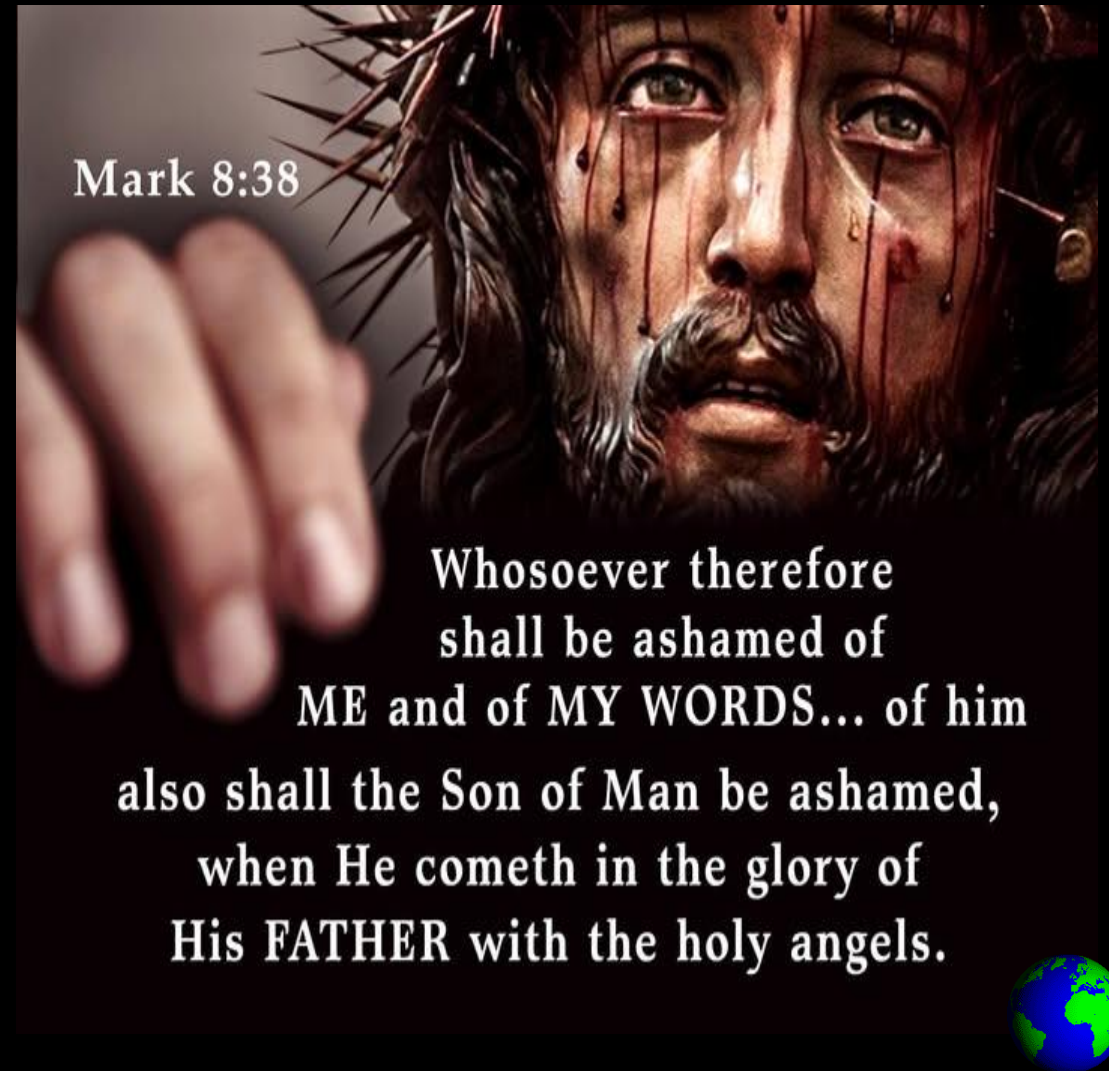
Mission and Understanding (Mark 7-8)

Heart over Tradition: Jesus challenges the Pharisees by emphasizing that true defilement comes from within (the heart) rather than breaking outward traditions.

The Secret/Revelation Motif: Jesus frequently asks for silence regarding His identity, leading to a climax in [Chapter 8](#).

"Who Do You Say I Am?": The central question of this section culminates in Peter's confession that Jesus is the Christ ([Mark 8:29](#)).

Taking Up the Cross: Immediately after Peter's confession, Jesus explains his path to the cross and instructs disciples to take up their own crosses.



Conclusion

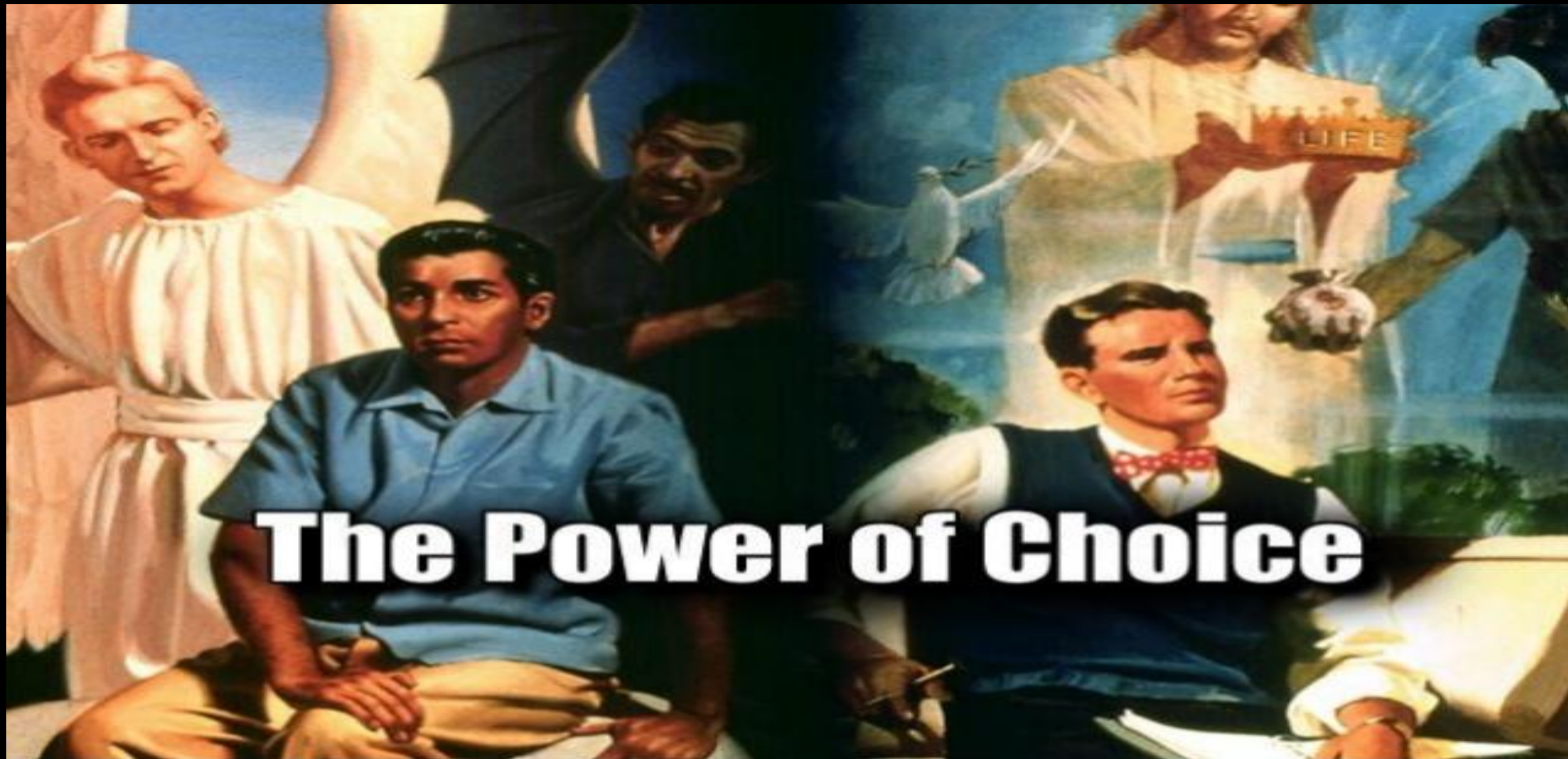
The Divinity of Christ: Despite the "suffering servant" image, Mark consistently establishes Jesus as the Son of God.

The Gospel of Service: Jesus is the ultimate Servant, teaching that true greatness comes from serving others rather than ruling over them.

The Need for Spiritual Sight: The healing of the blind man in [chapter 8](#) is a metaphor for the disciples' need to see Jesus properly as a suffering Messiah rather than a political liberator.

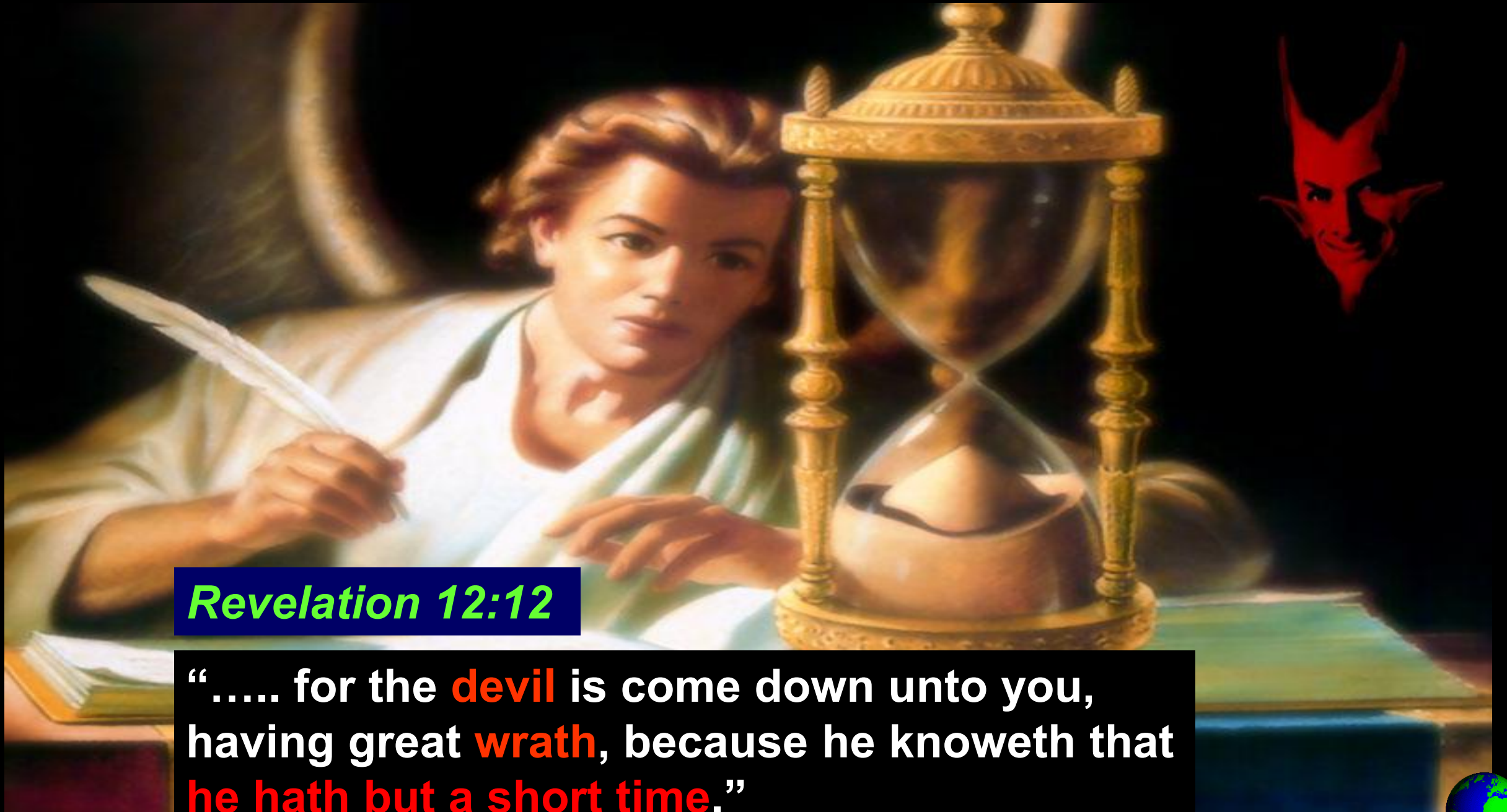
